Illinois State Scholar Program (SSP)

- Due to Spring 2020 ACT and SAT exams being rescheduled in response to COVID-19, the 2021-22 State Scholar announcement schedule is being adjusted and award announcements will occur later in the year than they normally would
- ISAC continues to accept sixth semester data that will be used in determination of 2021-22 State Scholars, along with scores from rescheduled ACT and SAT tests
- The final date on which sixth semester data will be accepted has not yet been determined.
 - High school counselors will be notified later this fall once the deadline date is established.




Illinois State Scholar Program (SSP)

- Submitting Sixth Semester Data
 - The sixth semester data used to determine State Scholars must be submitted via the SSP system in ISAC's Gift Assistance Programs (GAP) Access portal
 - All data files must be formatted according to ISAC specifications
 - Data will continue to be accepted until a deadline date is announced
 - High schools are encouraged to submit their data as soon as they are able to do so.
 - Sixth semester is defined as the third semester prior to graduation, which is typically the end of a student's junior year (excluding summer term).
 - High schools may choose from two options to submit required data:
 - Option One: Batches (via Excel Spreadsheets) AVAILABLE NOW
 - Option Two: Online Process NOT YET AVAILABLE
 - ➤ Because this process relies on ISAC's receipt of ACT and SAT scores, the availability of this option has been delayed. Schools that may have used the online process in the past may wish to consider using Option One to submit sixth semester data this year.



Illinois State Scholar Program (SSP)

- To submit sixth semester data via Option One (Batches via Excel Spreadsheets)
 - Create an Excel spreadsheet using specifications in ISAC SSP File Upload Template
 - It must be created using the SSP Data Exchange Layout.
 - A sample template is available
 - Refer to the SSP File Upload User Guide to learn about how to upload the file, view when the file is validated and how to correct errors online
 - When the Excel spreadsheet is ready to submit, log in to the GAP Access portal to access the SSP system and follow the on-screen prompts to upload your file to ISAC.
 - Once the file has been uploaded, a file validation process will begin



2021-22 Monetary Award Program (MAP) Grant

- The Fiscal Year 2022 (FY22) start-up formula was approved at ISAC's September 17, 2020 Commission meeting
 - Maximum annual award amount of \$5,340
 - Based on projections; assumes level funding
- The approved start-up formula is outlined in Item 5 of the Commission Meeting Agenda Book and may also be found in the MAP section in the FAA area of ISAC's website





2021-22 Priority Deadline Date

- Returning MAP recipients who submit their FAFSA by the announced priority deadline date will receive priority access to appropriated MAP funds
 - Returning recipients are defined as those students who received MAP funds during the previous academic year
 - For example, a student who received a MAP award in the 2020-21 award year would be considered a returning MAP recipient in the 2021-22 award year
 - Applicants must also continue to meet all other MAP eligibility criteria
- For the 2021-22 award year, the MAP priority deadline date is
 December 1, 2020
 - The FAFSA application must be submitted on or before December 1 to be considered for priority access to MAP
 - Applications received on or after December 2 will still be considered for a MAP award and processed according to the usual MAP application and suspense process
 - Note: the 2020-21 MAP Suspense date is July 1, 2020
 - 2020-21 FAFSAs or Alternative Applications received on or after this date are in suspended status



2021-22 MAP Award Notification Language

- Minor changes were made to the award notification language that colleges are required to provide to enrolled, MAP-eligible students
 - in response to legislation requiring references to potential SNAP benefits for need-based students (<u>Public Act 101-0560</u>)

2021-22 School-Issued Award Notification Letter

All schools are required to announce MAP Grant awards to all eligible students enrolled at their institutions, including students who are only eligible for a second semester/second and third quarter MAP award. Schools are required to clearly identify the awards on the award notification as: **State of IL MAP Grant (Est.)**.

Schools are also required to include the following information with the award notification:

By applying for financial aid and agreeing to share that information with the Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC) you have been considered for the State of Illinois (IL) Monetary Award Program (MAP) Grant. All MAP-approved institutions are required by the State of Illinois to announce MAP Grant awards to students who are enrolled or intending to enroll at their institution. An award amount is included in your financial aid package if you have met the eligibility criteria.

The MAP Grant award amount is an estimate made by the financial aid office and is identified as a "State of IL MAP Grant (Est)". Please be aware that the number of available MAP Grants is limited by funding levels approved by the Illinois General Assembly and the Governor, and reductions to estimated or actual MAP Grants are possible.

There are also limitations to how long you can continue to receive a MAP Grant. Usage is tracked by the number of credit hours for which you've received MAP benefits and is referred to as MAP Paid Credit Hours (MPCHs). The maximum number of MPCHs that can be received is 135, which is equivalent to approximately four and a half years of full-time enrollment. For your reference, and to learn more about MPCH limitations, you may access a record of your MPCHs, as well as other student resources, through the ISAC Student Portal at studentportal.isac.org.

Eligibility for the need-based MAP Grant award may be an indicator that you are eligible for state or federal benefits to assist you with cost of living expenses such as food or housing. Child and Dependent Care

If you need help caring for children or other dependents while attending college, several resources are available to you.

Illinois Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP)

The Child Care Assistance Program (CCAP) provides financial assistance to student parents who qualify. Eligible students are those who:

- live in Illinois
- work and/or are enrolled in an educational program
- have children under 13 who need care (or up to 19 for children with special needs), and
- have a family income below certain limits (based on family size).

Dependent Care Allowance

A student's cost of attendance (COA) for college is a key factor in determining the amount of financial aid that a student may be able to receive. For students with dependents, an allowance for costs for dependent care can be included in the COA, and it can be for care that includes but is not limited to class time, study time, internships, and commuting time for the student. The amount of the allowance will be based on the number and age of the dependents and cannot exceed reasonable costs in the community for the type of care provided.

By including the costs of child and/or dependent care in a student's financial aid calculation, the student may be able to access additional financial assistance. This may include loans, which, it is important to note, must be repaid, but some students may also be eligible for more grant or scholarship money. Students should work directly with the financial aid office at their college or university to determine eligibility, get guidance on whether this adjustment would benefit them, and recalculate their financial aid.

Because the college is not always aware that a student has dependent care expenses, it's important for the student to initiate contact with the financial aid office and explain the need to include this allowance in their COA so it can be taken into consideration when determining the full amount of financial aid the student may be eligible to receive.

Additionally, if a student has a special circumstance that would justify an increase in the dependent care allowance, the student should provide that information to the financial aid office as well. The college may require supporting documentation for special circumstances.

 - Available in the Apple App Store (iOS) and Google Play (Android)
 - An applicant can start on FOTW and finish on the mobile app, or vice versa
- No significant changes

- Became available September 27, 2020

 - A username and password is not required to access the site
 - Several types of test cases are provided and include FSA ID usernames and passwords to log in
- Can be used to:
 - Help you increase your understanding of fafsa.gov
 - Train new staff members or other school departments
 - Provide an introduction/orientation to students and parents
- At the demo site, you can:
 - Complete a sample FAFSA form
 - Make corrections
 - Check the status of the application


RISE Act Implementation

- The Retention of Illinois Students & Equity (RISE) Act went into effect Jan. 1, 2020
 - Allows eligible undocumented students and transgender students who are disqualified from federal financial aid to apply for all forms of state financial aid
 - Removed the 75-hour cap on MAP paid credit hours for freshmen and sophomores; the overall maximum of 135 MAP paid credit hours remains in effect
 - See the RISE Act information page for eligibility criteria and resource information

- To accommodate RISE Act-eligible students, ISAC created an Illinois-specific online application for MAP grants that is patterned after the FAFSA
- Application data is used to calculate an EFC and determine eligibility for MAP
 - 2020-21 Alternative Application was launched on January 6, 2020 and will remain available for students to complete until June 30, 2021
 - Enhancements were made to allow students to make updates/corrections and to allow students to submit an application without parental data
 - 2021-22 Alternative Application will be launched on October 1, 2020, the same day that the 2021-22 FAFSA will be made available
- The Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid is only available as an online application and it is not compatible with a mobile device

Retention of Illinois Students & Equity (RISE) Act and Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid

The Retention of Illinois Students & Equity (RISE) Act allows eligible undocumented students and transgender students who are disqualified from federal financial aid to apply for all forms of state financial aid. The Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid provides a pathway for these qualified students to apply for Monetary Award Program (MAP) grants, the state's largest need-based grant program for low-income college students.



The RISE Act also removed the 75-hour cap on Monetary Award Program (MAP) paid credit hours for freshmen and sophomores as of January 1, 2020. The overall maximum of 135 MAP paid credit hours remains in effect.

Pathway to Apply for ISAC Programs

The RISE Act creates a pathway to apply for ISAC gift assistance programs for the 2020-21 academic year - including MAP, the Minority Teachers of Illinois (MTI) Scholarship Program, the Illinois Special Education Teacher Tuition Waiver (SETTW) Programs and others - to those who meet the RISE Act criteria and each program's eligibility requirements. The RISE Act does not exempt applicants from meeting existing program eligibility criteria.

Undocumented Students

Undocumented students may be eligible to apply for ISAC's programs if they meet all of these criteria, which are based on Illinois statute regarding in-state tuition eligibility:

- public or private high school;
- the individual graduated from a public or private high s equivalent of a high school diploma in Illinois;
- the individual attended school in Illinois for at least 3 years individual graduated from high school or received the equ diploma:
- the individual provides an affidavit stating that the indiv application to become a permanent resident of the United opportunity the individual is eligible to do so; and
- the individual has not established a residence outside

Transgender Students

 Transgender students are also included in those eligib under the RISE Act. The RISE Act provides an application financial aid consideration other than using the Free Appli Aid (FAFSA®), which is used to qualify for both federal ar students may choose the application process that best su situation

Application for MAP

To accommodate RISE Act-eligible students (both undocumented and transgender students), ISAC has created an Illinois-specific online application for MAP grants. Instead of completing the FAFSA to begin the MAP application process, these students may choose to complete the Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid. The data from the application will be used to calculate an Expected Family Contribution (EFC), which is used in determining a student's MAP eligibility. The application, patterned after the FAFSA, is now available for the 2020-21 academic year.

The Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid is not currently compatible with mobile devices.

Application Process for MAP

The following describes in general terms the steps of application completion and the process used to determine MAP eligibility.


- The Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid is accessible online through the ISAC website.
- Pre-screening questions at the beginning of the application help students determine which application (RISE vs. FAFSA) should be completed.
- If an applicant's answers to the pre-screening questions show the Alternative Application should not be completed, a message will advise them to consult their high school counselor, a financial aid professional, or an ISACorps member for assistance in completing the FAFSA.
- Access the application here **ALTERNATIVE APPLICATION** FOR ILLINOIS FINANCIAL AID Intended for qualifying undocumented and

transgender students

- . Similar to the FAFSA, students will only complete the application questions that are relevant to them.
- An "Expected Family Contribution" (EFC) will be calculated from the information submitted on the Alternative Application, which will be used in determining a student's eligibility for MAP.
- MAP award amounts will be calculated for eligible students and provided to colleges by ISAC.
- · As with all MAP awards, eligibility notification will be provided to the student by the college

Alternative Application Pre-Screening Process

- Pre-screening questions at the beginning of the application help students determine which application (Alternative Application vs. FAFSA) should be completed
 - An applicant will only need to respond to the Pre-screening questions if it is their initial application
 - Renewal applicants will not see the pre-screening questions
 - Data provided by applicants in the pre-screening questions is not provided to colleges
 - Applicants who indicate in the pre-screening process that they are a transgender student will be asked to provide their Social Security Number
 - The SSN is not provided to the college; it is only used to track previous MAP Paid Credit Hours history
- If an applicant's answers to the pre-screening questions indicate the Alternative Application should not be completed, a message will advise them to consult their high school counselor, a financial aid professional, or an ISACorps member for assistance in completing the FAFSA

- Conditional permanent resident (I-551C)
- Other eligible noncitizen with an Arrival-Departure Record (I-94) from the Department of Homeland Security showing any one of
 the following designations: "Refugee," "Asylum Granted," "Indefinite Parole," "Humanitarian Parole," or "Cuban-Haitian Entrant"
- A citizen of the Republic of Palau (PW), the Republic of the Marshall Islands (MH), or the Federated States of Micronesia (FM).








Alternative Application Process: Pre-Screening Questions


Creating a Student Profile

 Once a student has navigated through the pre-screening questions and is determined eligible to complete the Alternative Application, the student will be prompted to

complete a Student Profile

 All fields are required, and the applicant should make note of the email, password and challenge question used to create their profile

- The e-mail address provided should be a permanent one that the student will have regular access to (not one used just for high school or college purposes)
- If the applicant also has an ISAC Student Portal Account, they will need to use a different e-mail than the one used for the Portal
- Once the Student Profile is complete, ISAC will assign an ISAC ID number that is unique to the student
 - This is a permanent identifier that will remain the same for a student every year





- Completing the Application
 - o There are seven sections in the application
 - Sections 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6 are about the student
 - Section 4 is about the parent
 - Section 7 is for signatures and certification
 - The questions in each section are essentially the same as the questions on the FAFSA, and help text is provided
 - Students should answer all questions as accurately as possible
 - Some fields are optional, but most are required
 - ➤ A gender question will be asked on the Alternative Application, but it is optional for the applicant to complete
 - Responses to the gender question will be not shared with the colleges
 - Messaging will be presented for required fields that are left blank and the student will need to provide answers before they can navigate to the next page
 - A "Save" button allows students to save their data and return at a later time to finish completing the application



- The same financial data elements collected on the FAFSA (income and assets) will also be collected on the Alternative Application so that an EFC can be calculated
- Once the application has been signed and submitted, an EFC will be used in the MAP Formula in the same way that it is used for FAFSA applicants
- The EFC, the eligible MAP award amount, and other relevant data elements will be provided to colleges as the Alternative Application Student Record in GAP Access
- Students should not complete both a FAFSA and an Alternative Application
 - o If they do, there will be two records for the student in GAP Access

Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid User Guide

The Retention of Illinois Students & Equity (RISE) Act, which went into effect on January 1, 2020, provides that "a student who is an Illinois resident and who is not otherwise eligible for federal financial aid, including, but not limited to, a transgender student who is disqualified for failure to register for selective service or a noncitizen student who has not obtained lawful permanent residence, shall be eligible for state financial aid and benefits ...".



The Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC) has developed the Alternative Application for Illinois Financial Aid to provide a pathway for students who meet the provisions of the RISE Act to apply for the Monetary Award Program (MAP) for the 2020-21 award year. The Alternative Application collects much of the same data as the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®), but is administered by ISAC.

Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®)

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) serves as the application for the MAP Grant. Each student who reports Illinois as his/her state of legal residence automatically applies for MAP when completing the FAFSA annually. The FAFSA should be completed as soon as possible after October 1 prior to the academic year that starts on or after July 1. Beginning with the 2020-21 academic year – returning MAP recipients (i.e., students who received MAP funds during the prior academic year and continue to meet all eligibility requirements) who submit their FAFSAs by that academic year's priority deadline date (set by ISAC annually) will receive priority access to appropriated MAP funds. The 2020-21 priority deadline date for returning applicants is on or before December 1, 2019.

The Central Processing System (CPS), on behalf of the U.S. Department of Education (ED), uses the FAFSA data to determine the student's Expected Family Contribution (EFC) by using the Federal Methodology formula. The student's family financial information (the FAFSA data) is made available to ISAC to calculate MAP eligibility. MAP award calculations will be done only for those Illinois students who list a MAP eligible school as one of their ten school choices on FAFSA on the Web or the four school choices on the paper FAFSA.

After completing a FAFSA (electronic or paper), students will receive an official output document called a Student Aid Report (SAR), An e-mail Notification of Processing is sent to the applicant within 1-3 days of processing with a link to access and print an electronic SAR (e-SAR), if the student provides an e-mail address. A SAR Acknowledgement is mailed to the applicant if the FAFSA is filled via FAFSA on the Web but an e-mail address is not provided. The schools that are listed by the student on the FAFSA receive the same data electronically and an electronical student.

Information Record (ISIR). Corrections to data must be made by or by the student on the SAR and mailed back to the CPS or electrocated applicant information is forwarded from the CPS to IS most recent data in its system.

Illinois FAFSA Mandate: Training and Support

Public Act 101-180 (effective 6/01/20) requires that, beginning with the 2020-2021 school year, public high school students must complete the FAFSA or, as eligible, the Alternative Application for Iffinois Financial Aid, as a prorequisite to receiving a high school diploma. A waiver provision basically allows a parent, quardian, or the student - if 18 or emancipated - to got out for any reason.

Pursuant to the law, the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) will lead these efforts. However, because of ISAC's deep experience in assisting students across the state with college planning, the financial aid process and FAFSA completion, ISAC will be supporting these efforts.

Making FAFSA completion part of an expectation for high school graduation can increase the number of students who are aware of the resources available to help them afford education or training after high school. This information can also help some students decide to attempt college when they might not otherwise have done so, and it may help some students limit student loan debt. and take a fuller course load to more quickly complete a degree or credential.




- To assist high school counselors with identifying students who have not completed a FAFSA/Alternative Application, ISAC administers a FAFSA Completion Initiative in its GAP Access portal
- Typically, ISAC has relied on lists submitted for the State Scholar program to create each high school's initial list of students, however, a new approach is being implemented this year in response to delays caused by COVID-19
- Starting in early October, a new procedure that uses an existing file upload function in the GAP Access portal is being implemented so high schools may begin uploading their senior class list into GAP Access to track FAFSA/Alternative Application completion
- The student list file must be formatted in Microsoft Excel 2003 or above, or in CSV, and follow ISAC's prescribed file layout.
- The data elements that will need to be uploaded for the high school's current senior class are: last name, first name, middle initial and date of birth




- Once uploaded, the list will be used to match to FAFSA and Alternative Application completion data on a weekly basis
 - With the U.S. Department of Education for FAFSA records
 - With ISAC for Alternative Applications records
- The ability for high schools to upload their lists will open up during the week of October 5, and the first week that completion data will be available is October 12
 - Completion data will not be available until high schools have uploaded their list of high school seniors into GAP Access
- It is important to note that the FAFSA Upload function is separate from the State Scholar Program File Upload process.








- After your school's list has been uploaded and matching has begun, counselors will be able to see aggregate data for their entire student body
- Data will include how many students have filed a FAFSA or Alternative Application, have received an EFC, are Pell-eligible, and are MAP-eligible
- Counselors can then access more specific data for students
 - There are no indicators regarding verification flags.








